CODE OF BEHAVIOUR

The Australian Nudist Federation (ANF) strongly supports the Laws of the Australian States and Territories in respect of harassment and public behaviour and will vigorously support these laws to its fullest. More stringent laws of any state or territory have precedence over this code of behaviour.

Furthermore, the ANF supports any ruling made by its affiliates in respect of behaviour of individuals, couples or groups whilst at their facilities.

- a) The rights of every person, especially children, are paramount in a clothes free environment.
- b) Further to the comments above, the ANF has no intention of inhibiting or prohibiting mutually acceptable affectionate gestures within family units. Nor does it intend to intrude into relationships or the private acts of consenting adults.
- c) The ANF will not condone sexual harassment or public sexual acts. These will have no place within the ANF and WILL NOT BE TOLERATED.

UNACCEPTABLE BEHAVIOUR

Unacceptable behaviour is defined as persistent staring, stalking or following, voyeuristic positioning or crowding of an individuals personal space. It also includes other overt sexual acts or displays as well as any aggressive acts or threatening body language.

PHOTOGRAPHY

Unauthorised photography and/or videoing (including use of camera phones) of adults and minors will not be tolerated at ANF member clubs, resorts, social groups or recognised free beaches etc., unless permission is obtained in advance from the appropriate governing body.

- a) Prior permission must be obtained by the adult who is to be photographed and, in respect of children; prior parental approval must be obtained. Permission must be gained from any person who would be likely to be in the field of view.
- b) It is incumbent on the photographer to be responsible in the choice of the photographic subject, angle, background etc. Anyone who is aware of a photographer taking less than acceptable photos is obliged to report that person to the appropriate authorities.

UNWELCOMED COMMUNICATIONS

Unwelcomed communications is defined as any unwanted advances, remarks, suggestions, propositions, gestures, threats, messages, ridicule or jokes of a crude or sexual nature. Persistent attempts to engage another person in clearly undesired conversation must be reported to the appropriate authorities. Unsolicited comments and/or gestures about a person's body are also considered unacceptable.

INAPPROPRIATE TOUCHING

Inappropriate touching is defined as unwelcome touching of another persons' body without consent. Family ambience by reporting, in a timely manner, either to the club, resort or social group authorities or statutory authorities any situation they feel is contrary to this code of behaviour.
